Dear Friends.

It has been a big year for Acting Without Boundaries and I greatly appreciate you taking the time to read about our accomplishments in our annual report. The curtain has risen again at AWB despite the pandemic, and the staff and actors are thrilled! The AWB family is back together in person, and it feels wonderful. A big thank you to the AWB staff and Board of Directors for their support during this transitional yet impactful period.

Last spring, the AWB Seniors and AWB Juniors came together to do a live performance of Meet Me in St. Louis in Centennial Hall at The Haverford School. For the first time in AWB's 18 year history, we had a multi-media performance where actors were simultaneously virtual and in person. It was new and experimental and came off without a hitch! In the summer, we had our fourth annual Masters' program. This year's focus was "Acting for Film." The participants learned camera and lighting techniques and how to act specifically for film. The class was split into groups of two and they recorded short scenes from popular movies. Participants came from AWB Seniors and the AWB Acting Lab at Inglis and Magee.

Our Acting Lab grew by partnering with the University of Pennsylvania's Cerebral Palsy Support Group and continuing our partnerships with Inglis and Magee. Our programs flourished both virtually and in person and culminated in videos written and performed by the actors. The Melodies program has been busy traveling to local elementary schools and events and featured a caroling gathering at a retirement community. A highlight of the Melodies program was presenting at Temple University's Lewis Katz School of Medicine to second year medical students. Actors and a few parents presented a disability awareness program focusing on doctor and patient communication and interactions. We received amazing feedback, and we plan on expanding this offering in 2023.

In the fall, we honored Alysse Einbender, a fine art sculptor, at the Seventh Annual Hero Award that was held at Water Works by Cescaphe in Philadelphia. It was an incredible event that raised over \$225,000 for AWB programs. Next, the AWB Senior actors performed a staged reading of The Contrast in collaboration with The Philadelphia Artists' Collective (PAC) at the Independence Seaport Museum in Philadelphia. It was an amazing experience for our actors who got to work hand in hand with professional actors.

We've enjoyed this year of reuniting with one another and sharing the love of the arts, and because of supporters like you, we can continue improving the lives of people with physical disabilities through performing arts programs that celebrate our actors' many abilities!



The AWB Acting Lab program is an important part of AWB's growth since 2019. Through the Acting Lab, we have expanded our programming to serve more people with physical disabilities by utilizing our unique performing arts curricula.

The AWB Melodies Program is our outreach and educational program that allows us to fulfill our important mission of sharing what people with disabilities can do!

Disability is a unique form of diversity that includes individuals from all backgrounds and identities, and is not limited by age, social class, religion, race, gender, or sexual orientation. At AWB we see disability as a unifying force, a common ground where voices from all sectors of society can come together to be heard and represented. It is essential that we actively engage and include all members of our society, that those outside the disability community understand and recognize the importance of the perspectives and experiences of people with disabilities.

Through the Melodies Program, we facilitate conversations in the community and spread awareness and emphasize the importance of diversity and inclusion. 2022 was a jam-packed year with six unique Melodies programs held at Temple University, Caskey Torah Academy, Holy Child Academy, Mission 5 & 2 Camp, Bryn Mawr Day and Wesley Enhanced Living at Stapeley. We led a presentation including a panel discussion at the Lewis Katz

School of Medicine at Temple University with nearly two hundred, second year medical students. Emphasizing the importance of communication and understanding between physicians and people with physical disabilities.

We also spread awareness through our Spotlight 180 video series where an actor, staff member or special quest is interviewed for 3 minutes, or 180 seconds, to discuss AWB's impact. Our Jr. and Sr. actors are invited to a weekly TGIF social via zoom where they can chat and check in with one another, deepening friendships within the AWB community. Three social outings were held in 2022 as an opportunity to get together in-person. AWB participants and their families went to The Arden Theatre to see The Glass Menagerie, featuring an AWB alumni actor, the Uptown! Knauer Performing Arts Center to see Neill Hartley perform in The Butterfingers Angel..., and our 2022 Hero Award honoree, Alysse Einbender, held a Play with Clay workshop letting us try our hand in sculpture. UNIQUE PERFORMING ARTS PROGRAMS FOR PEOPLE WITH PHYSICAL DISABILITIES

Acting Without Boundaries Junior Program is bursting with our imaginative children and teens who love taking part in the creative process of their annual production.

In a typical year, under the direction of AWB Jr. Artistic Director, Maria Ceferatti, our Jr. actors meet once a mont for 10 months to create a musical, based on a children's story or fable, and perform their show in the spring. At the monthly workshops, our actors dive into the performing arts and learn about music, movement, character and text development. Our actors grow together as a group throughout the year collaborating and learning new skills both theater and life based. The culmination of their wor produces an impressive show for the community at large to enjoy. Each actor takes part in helping to write the script and song lyrics and are responsible for bringing life to their characters!

CTING WITHOUT BOUNDARIES

Our senior actors range from older teens to adults. In preparation for live performances, they meet monthly from November to October with an added 4-day intensive workshop in July. Through these workshops they not only perfect their lines, they learn to creatively express themselves, collaborate with one another, and form longlasting friendships.

This year, the AWB Seniors and AWB Juniors joined together for the first live performance since the pandemic hit in 2020 to present *Meet Me in St. Louis* in April. This multi-media performance, brought us all back together with most of the actors appearing on stage in-person and a few actors appearing virtually on a big zoom screen placed on the stage. Once *Meet Me in St. Louis* wrapped up, our fantastic Sr. actors began working on their next performance— a period piece set in the 1700's titled *The Contrast.* We partnered with The Philadelphia Artists' Collective (PAC) to perform with two of their professional able-bodied actors at the Independence Seaport Museum in Philadelphia. *The Contrast* was produced as a stage reading, permitting actors to have their scripts with them and included minimal staging and movement. Ms. Ceferatti with the support of two student musicians, added music into the show which immersed us into the era experience even further. This type of production granted our actors the chance to dive into a challenging text and focus on the motivations of their characters. Audience members and performers alike loved this exciting new endeavor. Through the generosity of a donor, all AWB actors were paid a stipend for their performance of *The Contrast*. of AWB actors reported that




